News from the Mayors Chair – Summer 2017

SHORT TERM PLAN

We have been busy getting things ready for our summer. The splash park should be opening June 1st and Canada Day 150 celebration planning is well underway.

Over the summer we will be focusing on dust control of our roads and keeping our green spaces looking good.

ROADS

The main project over the next four years is to have all our streets seal coated; we are starting this summer, which is why there are pylons on the roads to mark the services for the road works. We will continue for the next 3 years.

Please bear with us. We know that our streets are in need of repair.

LONG TERM PLANS

Council is looking at alleviating the flooding problems with constructing a west side drainage that will go on the North end of the Town.
This drainage ditch will help with the spring runoff and heavy rains throughout the summer.
This is an expensive undertaking, but most would agree, vital to help prevent future flooding of our town.

WATER

Hopefully before the end of the year, you will be drinking water from your tap because we are installing a reverse osmosis unit at the water plant.

The water plant is also getting revamped with new pumps & electrical.

This is an expensive undertaking but will eliminate a lot of problems for the home owner, by not having to replace your hot water tank, taps, etc.

We believe that we may need to increase the utility rate one more time to help make the payment.
The amount right now is not known but it may be between \$10.00 to \$15.00 per month.

TAXATION

2017 was a re-assessment year, where all properties in Saskatchewan are re-evaluated. On average, most of the Municipal taxes went up slightly.

The average tax increase is between 2-6%. This also depends on if you have any additions to your property such as adding a deck, garage or basement completion. The base tax went up from \$350.00 to \$400.00 on residential, and from \$500.00 to \$700.00 for commercial, however, some of the commercial property values went down and some have increased, depending on the circumstances such as being under assessed.

As for the school, the Government of Saskatchewan sets the school mill rate which will increase almost everyone's property taxes.

Council doesn't have any say in the school taxes.
